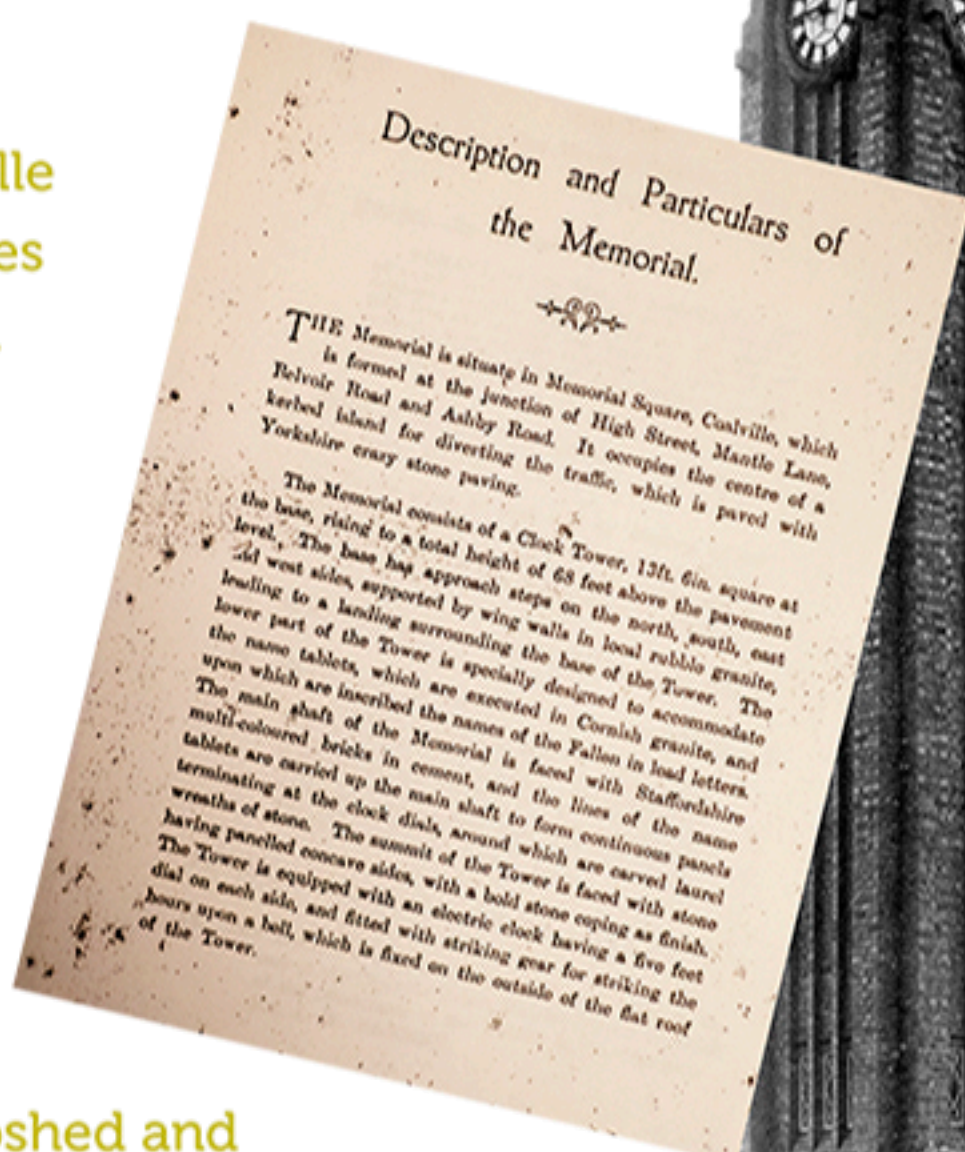


## A Well-Loved Landmark



The Memorial Clock Tower was designed to replace the memorial to the fallen which had been installed in the boundary wall of the old railway station in 1919.

In March 1920 the Coalville Times asked for the names of men who had fallen in the First World War from the Coalville Urban Area including Coalville, Whitwick, Hugglescote, Donington le Heath and Ellistown. By 1924 354 names had been submitted, including a few men from Ibstock, Donington, Shepshed and Measham.



Three stones of remembrance were added after the Second World War and further names were added in 2014 to commemorate those who died in more recent conflicts.

The Memorial Clock Tower is part of the Coalville urban landscape and holds many memories for local communities. This Grade II listed structure is the focal point for the town's large Remembrance Day event and a significant historical monument.
