1 The relevant statutory provisions are set out in Section 34 Gaming Act 1968 as amended by Licensing Act 2003 Schedule 6, paragraph 52 and Gambling Act 2005 Schedule 16, paragraphs 3(7) and (8)) **Notes:**

1. The relevant statutory provisions are set out in Section 283 and Schedule 13 of the Gambling Act 2005.

2. The premises must be licensed under the Licensing Act 2003 to sell alcohol.

3. If you apply for this type of permit then this will effectively replace and not be in addition to your automatic entitlement to two gaming machines under the Gambling Act 2005.

4. The gaming machines must be located on these licensed premises.

5. An application may not be made if a premises licence under the Gambling Act 2005 is in force at the premises.

6. A premises licence holder is a person holding a premises licence under the Licensing Act 2003.

7. Section 282 of the Gambling Act 2005 provides an automatic entitlement to make available two gaming machines (Category C or D) for use in alcohol licensed premises. To take advantage of this automatic entitlement, the person who holds the on-premises licence must give notice to the licensing authority of their intention to make gaming machines available for use. Please contact the Licensing Authority if you wish to make use of this provision.

8. This application form is for alcohol licensed premises to make more than two machines available for use. There is no statutory limit to the number of machines that you may apply for however you may wish to contact the licensing authority to ask whether there is a local policy where decisions on applications for certain number of machines are made via a hearing of the Sub-Committee.

9. A permit will cease to have effect if-

a) an on-premises alcohol licence ceases to have effect with respect to the premises to which it relates, or

b) the permit holder ceases to be the holder of an on-premises alcohol licence.

10. The Gambling Act 2005 permits two types of gaming machines on an alcohol licensed premises which are:

a) Category C gaming machines i.e. maximum stake of 50p and maximum prize £35;

b) Category D gaming machines i.e. maximum stake 10p or 30p when non-monetary prize and maximum prize £4 cash or £8 non-monetary prize.

The application needs to be made for the **total number** of machines. This enables any combination of either type to be utilised up to the maximum number licensed.

11. The first annual fee for the permit of £50 is payable within 30 days of the date of issue of the permit. Thereafter, the annual fee of £50 is payable 12 months after the date of issue of the permit.
